### **Recycling at WPLM**

You can still drop off old eyeglasses (with or without cases), as well as used ink cartridges and cell phones in the WPLM foyer for recycling. Household batteries are no longer being accepted, because they are not currently being accepted in bulk for recycling by local retailers. WPLM is exploring other options, but please consider investing in rechargeable batteries and chargers. Rechargeable batteries create less hazardous waste, and some local electronics and home improvement stores do accept rechargeable batteries for recycling.

### **Cleaning Up for Good**

If you end the holiday season with Christmas lights that no longer work you can bring them to a local Lowe's store for recycling. If you are running out of room in your closets and cabinets consider donating clothes and household items to second-hand stores. BLH Recycling and Best Buy accept a variety of outdated electronics for free, and other items, like TV's, are accepted for a small fee. Check their web sites for details.

### **Local History**

Whether you have lived in Williamsville for four years or forty years, you can learn something new when you tour the museum displays featuring community organizations. You will discover how hundreds of volunteers have donated their time over the years to everything from community wide celebrations to rebuilding the arch on the boulevard. WPLM also has

permanent displays including pictures of Old Route 66 and local one room schoolhouses. When you check out items at the service desk you will see a sign from Dr. Stuttle's office. Dr. A. L. Stuttle, originally from the Licthfield area, opened his practice in 1900 in Williamsville. For 64 years he served the Williamsville community and



delivered over 2,000 babies. He married a local woman, Pearl Jones, in 1902 and raised two children here. Dr. Stuttle was a Williamsville School Board Member for 29 years and a member of various community groups. Stop by WPLM to learn about others who have served Williamsville over the years and helped make it into the community you now call home.

### **Outdoor Updates**

A lot of progress was made on the Outdoor Education Space this fall. The sidewalks are done, the fence is up, the shed is built, and the display beds have been constructed. WPLM has appreciated the ongoing community support of the project. Mrs. Smith and some of her FFA students helped assemble raised container beds and a compost tumbler this fall, and more will be done in the spring. WPLM also owes Jack Ealey, of Ealey Transportation, tons of thanks! Jack donated his time for consultations on the site and donated all the rock, which created the swale and the museum display borders. Work should be completed this spring so the site can be open to the public by early summer.

# Library at Your Fingertips

If one of your New Year's resolutions is to spend less money, WPLM has an app for that. WPLM patrons can use the SHARE app from the Illinois Heartland Library System. Download the app to your phone. The next time you see a book or audiobook you are interested in just use the app to scan the ISBN barcode. You will be able to see immediately if it is available through the library, and then you can request the item rather than buying it. Instead of buying audiobooks, you can access thousands of titles on Libby by Overdrive or with Cloud Library. Movies, TV shows, music and more are also available for streaming with Hoopla.





### **Winter Gardening Tips**

Most people look at winter as an off-season for gardening, but there is still plenty you can do for your garden to make it succeed. The following three tips from www.polywood.com are excellent resources for gardening during the winter months!

### 1. Start an At-Home Compost System to Support your Garden

Composting is the natural process of decomposing food and yard waste. It helps to cut fertilizer costs and feed your plants the nutrients they need to flourish. You're also contributing less to the landfills that produce harmful greenhouse gases, like methane.

#### 2. Begin Sowing Seeds Indoors

In January and February, get a head start and sow some seeds indoors. You'll need seed starting trays and good potting soil made for seed starting. Keep your seeds in a warm room with plenty of light and moisten the soil regularly. Follow the directions on the back of the seed packets for the best results.

A week before taking your seedlings outside to plant, set them outdoors in a sunny spot. Then, bring them back inside in the evening. This process helps your seedlings get acclimated to the outdoor weather.

#### 3. Start Collecting Rainwater

Rainwater harvesting is great and eco-friendly. Without a filtration system, tap water can contain toxins and pollutants that are harmful to your plants. Rainwater is naturally clean and soft, which means it's suitable for gardening, washing and cleaning.

There are a couple ways to collect rainwater. A rain barrel is the best method to start with. Just place a barrel under your downspout to collect rainwater. If you decide to keep collecting rainwater, you can move on to wet or dry collection systems.

# **Be Prepared for Winter Storms**

Winter storms create a higher risk of car accidents, hypothermia, frostbite, carbon monoxide poisoning and heart attacks from overexertion.

If you are under a winter storm warning, find shelter right away and follow these safety guidelines.

- \* Stay off the roads
- Stay indoors and dress warm
- Prepare for power outages
- Only use generators outdoors
- \* Listen for emergency information and alerts
- \* Look for signs of hypothermia and frostbite
- \* Check on your neighbors

### Winter Safety Hazards

Carbon monoxide poisoning and fires can be common during the winter, especially due to generators and heaters. Be sure to take these precautions to avoid the dangers of carbon monoxide and fires.

Carbon monoxide is an odorless gas that can be

deadly within *minutes*. To help prevent this, be sure to place portable generators **outside** at least 20 feet away from windows, doors and vents. Never use them inside or in a garage. The fumes can enter air vent and/or your house and create a dangerous situation for everyone inside.

Also, be sure to make sure your carbon monoxide alarms are working. Since carbon monoxide is odorless, you will not smell it, making these alarms much more important. They could be your first indication that there is a problem and to evacuate the house.

Another danger during the winter are space heaters. According to the NFPA, half of all home heating fires occur from the months of December to February. Space heaters commonly contribute to these statistics when not used carefully. When using a space heater, place it *at least* three feet away from flammable materials. Install smoke alarms on every floor and every bedroom to alert you of any potential fire.

Other great tips are to only plug one heat-producing appliance into an electrical outlet at one time, have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney and vents every year, and store cooled ashes in a tightly covered metal container, and keep it outside at least ten feet from any nearby building.

Also, test your smoke alarms regularly to make sure they are working, and replace the batteries once a year.
